You, Lucky Ducks!

BRC water fowl receive pet-like preference



65% of U.S. households own pets and get to experience the joy of coming home to a loyal companion at the end of a long day. Those of us who are fortunate enough to

own pets understand that their unconditional love and acceptance does way more for us than just keep us company; owning a pet is good for the soul. Having a family pet can create a warm and inviting atmosphere for any home like nothing else can. Studies have shown that having a pet can reduce stress, improve heart health, and can even help children who struggle socially or emotionally. At BRC, our


campus individuals may not be able to have pets of their own, but many of them, like Antonio (pictured above) love to take full advantage of the entertainment the BRC ducks offer both on the water and on land. Antonio says he enjoys coming to the lake each afternoon to feed the ducks; he takes a lot of pride in caring for them, and he knows how excited they get when they see him walking toward the lake each day. As soon as he casts a handful of corn onto the ground, they all scurry about, gobbling up as much food as possible, trying to keep the others from taking more than their fair share. Unlike the BRC geese, that have quietly moved on with the change of season, the ducks here at Boswell are non-migratory, and they consistently forage on insects and seeds during non-feeding times. They are mostly a Muscovy breed (brown/black & white), mixed with a few Pekins (solid white). An interesting thing about the Muscovy is, it's technically not even a duck. It's a South American waterfowl that has a body like a duck, a breast like a turkey; it roosts like a chicken and hisses like a goose. Some might say this debunks the assumption that if something walks like a duck and guacks like a duck, it's a duck. The Pekin, on the other hand, is an actual duck; it's a multi-purpose breed, meaning it can be raised for both meat and egg production. Because of their docile demeanor, they are more suitable and easily one of the most popular breeds for backyards and homesteads. Every duck and waterfowl here at Boswell, much like the Peabody ducks in Memphis, are highly regarded, so much so that if an employee carelessly runs over one or attempts to cause deliberate harm to one of these beautiful birds, he/she could face severe repercussions, up to and including termination. So, when it comes to all the feathered friends on the Boswell campus, the best rule of thumb might be to protect each one much like you would your own beloved family pet, because to many of the individuals here, that's exactly what they are.

That's the number of people who lost their lives as a result of the 9/11 terrorist attack. Just for reference, that would have been more people than the entire population of Mendenhall, MS at the time. Of these men and women, more than 400 New York City firefighters and police officers paid the ultimate sacrifice, making the phrase, "To Protect and Serve" more than just a slogan.



In remembrance of 9-11, Special guest Phillip Magee, from the City of Magee Fire Department, visited the individuals at Dream Extreme, wearing full fireman's gear. He discussed the role of the firefighters from 9-11, including the 45 pound weight of the fireman's gear (not including the weight of victims they likely carried) and the 110 flights of stairs they had to climb. In addition, he took advantage of the opportunity to discuss fire safety with the individuals. He covered basic fire precaution measures and what someone should do if they find themselves in a dangerous, fire-related situation. There was a question-answer session as well as an opportunity for individuals to test the weight of a fireman's equipment. Afterwards, the staff led individuals in a timed group activity simulating how quickly a fireman must get dressed before responding to a fire.

Right: Each team was given a mere 5 minutes to coordinate together and assemble a small puzzle. While this would be a great challenge for most any of us, a fireman must be able to complete the task of getting dressed much more quickly. One of the requirements for completing Fire Fighter Training is for the recruit to put on all Personal Protective Equipment, a breathing apparatus, and be on air in less than <u>90 seconds</u>. This includes pants, coat, hood, boots, helmet, gloves, and an air pack. The current record for this is an unbelievable 43 seconds!
