





Raymond Johnson retires from Boswell Regional Center



The days are getting longer and much warmer as we usher in summertime and all that comes along with it. This year, however, it's a bittersweet time for our BRC family. Long-time facility director, Mr. Raymond Johnson, announced his retirement for June 30, 2012. As the date draws near, we want to take a moment to remember his contributions to Boswell and his public service to the State of Mississippi.

During his years with the Department of Mental Health, Mr. Johnson has served in various administrative positions. He began his career in 1989 as a Personnel Officer at Mississippi State Hospital. Later, he was promoted to the Staff Education Director. After his time with MSH, he transferred in November 1994 to South Mississippi Regional Center as a Bureau Director. He worked for and with the staff and individuals of SMRC until July 1995.

So in 1995, Mr. Johnson joined the Boswell family under the supervision of Ms. Susie Lassiter as Assistant Director. In 2000, he was promoted to the position of Facility Director where he served until his retirement in June 2012. His tenure as Facility Director earns him the distinct designation of the longest serving Facility Director for BRC thus far.

During his service as Director, Mr. Johnson has played a major role in the beautification of the campus and in a number of projects

As the longest serving Director for BRC, many changes have come to pass under his leadership. A quote from Mr. Johnson himself sums it up best: "When we invest in a new structure or upgrade our surroundings, it is tangible proof of the importance we place on the activity that will take place there...whether it's creating a new home for our individuals, enhancing the overall scenery and recreational areas they enjoy on a daily basis, or providing space for employees to accomplish greater tasks for those we serve." This statement was made about the opening of the State Farm apartments and truly embodies Mr. Johnson's vision for Boswell and the mobilization for us to get there.

In addition to being a graduate of The University of Southern Mississippi, with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, Mr. Johnson also graduated from William Carey University with a Masters of Education degree and from the John C. Stennis Institute of Government, Mississippi State University. He is a Licensed Nursing Home Administrator, Certified Public Manager, Certified Mental Health Therapist, Certified Mental Retardation Therapist, Certified Mental Health Administrator, and Certified Volunteer Fireman. Mr. Johnson is a recipient of the Bradley A. Sanders Service award. Upon his retirement, the mayor of Magee, Jimmy Clyde presented Mr. Johnson with a proclamation for his service and a key to the city.

Boswell's Pine Straw Project

In a time of cutbacks for state agencies, Boswell Regional Center has found a new money maker: collecting and selling the pine straw. Boswell officials told the state Board of Mental Health they expect to gross \$20,000 a year from selling the pine straw that falls on some of Boswell's more than 30 acres.

“The clients get paid for their work”, explained Raymond Johnson, Boswell facility director. “And the little bit of profit goes into the special-needs fund, where it will be spent on client projects. We're hoping it will expand the services we can't.”


The acres of pine trees on BRC property weren't bringing the facility any money, but what about the pine straw that blanketed the ground beneath them?

At first they started clearing the pine straw by hand. Then, they realized they needed more training to deal with the snakes and insects. Boswell officials studied farms in the Delta that harvest pine straw commercially and ended up buying equipment that would condition the pine straw and turn it into bales.

Officials hope to soon recover on their investment, and then would put any profits the pine straw project makes back into the program to


